Students work in teams of 3 to draw and write sentences for posters about creating peace in our classroom community, in our home community, and in our world community. (See next page.)

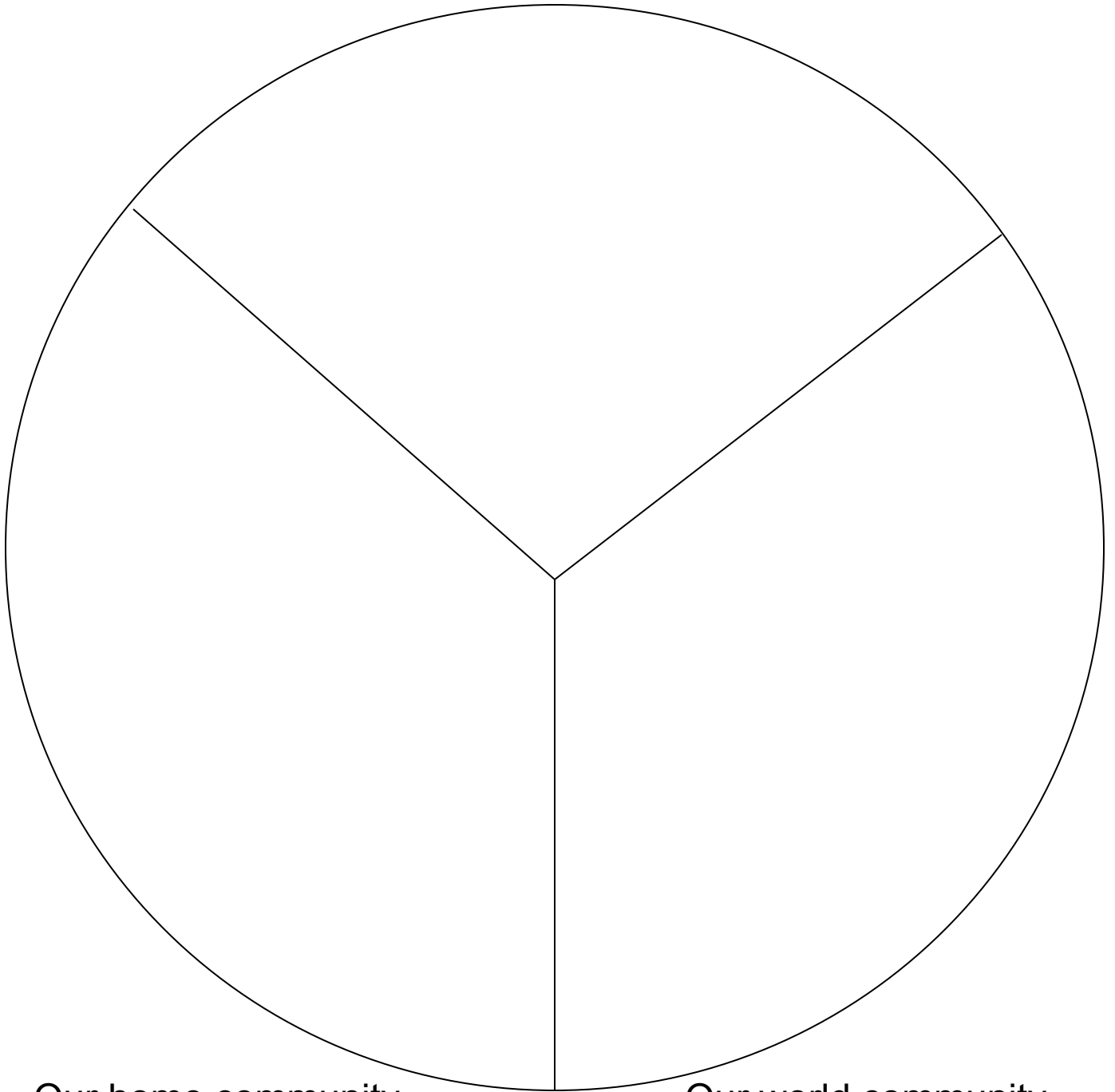
These teams then write an essay to share about what they drew on their poster. The poster becomes the cover sheet for the essay.

A team of Rotarians will judge the posters and their accompanying essays. The winning team will be announced and the team's poster will be turned into a greeting card, with one copy given to all participants with our thanks to all teams that participated in this Poster/Essay Contest.

In addition, all the posters with their essays attached will be put on display at the conclusion of the contest at the students' school.

Rubric for Rotary Peace in Our World Poster/Essay Project

The essay is expected to be typed using word processing software and printed. Teams are expected to staple their poster on top of their essay. The poster serves as the cover sheet for the essay. Teams are expected to write their names on the bottom of their poster and to type their names under the title of their essay on the top of page 1 of their essay.
